#### Aquatic plant monitoring


Ourrently no provincial wide programs – yet one of the most noticeable components of our lake ecosystems

Different interest groups may have conflicting ideas of what plants are desirable in what locations. Swimmers, waterskiers and boaters like NO plants, whereas fisherman may see a modest macrophyte stand as good fish habitat.

## Why do we monitor their growth each year?

- provide helpful information for lake managers that are faced with the difficult job of determining what is classified as "excessive growth" versus that which is considered natural
- allow for the early detection and identification of new infestations of exotic and invasive plants.
- 3. Education of shoreline residents of natural trends in abundance of aquatic plants
- 4. Understand how lakes are responding to climate change
